- Targets were set and shared in Y10.




#### Working at grade:

- Where they are at a point in time
- A teacher assessed grade based on performance to date in the content covered so far – so will usually be lower than the target grade
- WAGs should show progress over time





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#### **Predicted grade:**


- A prediction by teachers/faculties of what they think your child is likely to achieve at the end of Year 11, if they continue their current rate of progress.
- It is likely to be closer to (but not always the same as) the Target Grade.




Target Grade – remains the same

Predicted Grade – may change, but should be on or just below their target

WAG – should be gradually increasing over time to get closer to prediction/target.





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

#### How to revise?

Everyone knows that you need to revise well for your GCSE exams

The challenge though is knowing HOW to revise and ensure that the time spent revising is effective



### When to start?

Time is your friend, and AT THE MOMENT, you have lots of it

You know the dates of the real thing and when your mock exams will be, so **now is the time** to start the revision process

Your first task will be to plan a revision timetable that will take you up to your mock exams – little and often now will mean less worry and pressure when you get closer to your exams

### Now you have organised your time...

- Start off by gathering your information know what each exam paper will be covering!
  - Mind map divide into sub-sections and make links
  - Flash cards learn definitions, vocabulary, quotes etc. and allow retrieval practice through recall
  - Key word vocabulary lists vital to understand the content of the exam
  - Dual coding create an image to go with a concept or theme

You will find a way that works for you – no evidence of any of the above being more effective than the other

### Now that you have gathered your information...

You need to do something with it!

Read it, go over it, go over it again in manageable chunks

Don't expect it to go in though just by doing this

After you have revised the information the MOST IMPORTANT STEP is to get someone to test you on the information – this helps you understand what you do know and what you don't know

Instinctively, we always focus on the stuff we know because that makes us feel good about things – it is more important to focus on the stuff you don't know!



#### The Pomodoro Technique

### The Leitner System

Index cards that have questions on one side and answers on the other are a great way of revising.

The Leitner System

•All index cards are placed in box one. These are revised every day.

•When you know the answer without checking you place the card into box two. These are revised every second day.

•When you know the answer to the cards in box two without checking you place them in box three. These are revised every third day.

•When you know the answer to the cars in box three without checking you remove the cards.


